At 6 p.m. Board President Valles reconvened to open session and announced that there were no actions taken in Closed Session and as a result of the delay of the start of the meeting the agenda was moved to conduct the bond/construction workshop.

Presentations related to the bond and future construction projects were conducted by Jim Roth, Bond Underwriter with Piper Jaffray, David Casnocha, Bond Council, and from gkkworks Al McQuilkin and Matt Greiner.

An overview of where the bond plan is and what opportunities are available were presented by Jim Roth and David Casnocha. The news is not very good. The severe real estate recession has impacted the bond, making the sale of the bonds highly unlikely.

Mr. McQuilkin and Mr. Greiner presented three suggested construction sites for the One-Stop Building highlighting the pros and cons for each site

Following the presentations, a unanimous direction was provided by the board to go forward with Option C for the construction of the One Stop Building located on lower campus and to scale back the project to fit within the available bond money.

The District wishes to submit for approval payment for emergency repairs completed by Cooley Construction, Inc. for a manhole cover that was damaged during the Parking Lot Repair project (Board approved May 11, 2010). Cooley Construction, Inc. was grinding Fish Hatchery Road and hit a manhole that was not marked by Dig Alert. This tore up the sewer ring, causing concrete and debris to fall into the sewer. Cooley Construction, Inc. had to perform emergency repairs to vacuum out and rebuild the rings and manhole and bring it to the same elevation as the street. County Service Area 64 should have contracted with Dig Alert to mark the covered manhole.

Executive Summary

Victor Valley College is an attractive, well-planned campus located some five miles east of the I-15 on Bear Valley Road over looking the Mojave River Valley. The core of the campus is designed around a man-made (Boise Cascade) lake, contributing substantially to the attractiveness of the campus, but adding to the complexity of planning a core for the campus to build out from.

Victor Valley College's service area is part of what Economist John Husing calls the "Third Ring of Economic Development out of the Los Angeles Basin". The ring extends across the Lancaster/Palmdale, Victorville, Ontario/San Bernardino, Riverside and the I-15 corridor. As a result, this is one of the most rapidly growing areas in California. For example, according to the U.S. Census Bureau the four incorporated cities within the Victor Valley College service area increased in population from 198,980 in the census year 2000 to 285,850 in 2007. This was an increase of 86,870 or a phenomenal 43.6 percent change. The city of Victorville experienced both the greatest absolute amount and percentage increase: from 60,039 in 2000 to 102,538 in 2007, an increase of 38,509 residents, or 60.1 percent. Hesperia is the second largest incorporated city with 85,876 residents in 2007, a 37.2 percent increase over 2000.

What John Husing called "cheap dirt" and location are driving this growth. The greater Los Angeles and Orange County areas no longer have affordable housing available for working families. Sky-high land costs in these areas are pushing companies and their employees to the Inland Empire and the High Desert. Victor Valley is the jewel of the Inland Empire, and is where the next major land boom in California is already underway. John Husing believes Victor Valley is becoming the new center for California's distribution industry.

In light of the rapidly developing distribution industry and the availability of reasonably priced land, these population projections are probably conservative.

These population forecast data clearly present a need for Victor Valley College to assertively plan for teaching/learning facilities and other campus sites to be prepared for student increases and demands for classes and services these data predict. As the state funding process is so slow - typically at least six to eight years from the initial request for funding (an IPP), consideration to occupancy (use), and one instructional building at a time, the District has planned for other sources of funding for needed facilities and campuses, e.g., General Obligation Bond funds.

Student Population

The Victor Valley College student population increased from 8,678 for the 1990 Fall Semester to 13,989 for 2009 the Fall Semester, a 61.2 percent change. However, Weekly Student Contact Hours (WSCH) increased from 69,290 to 165,364 for the same period of time, a significant 138.7 percent increase. Students enrolled in an average of 7.98 hours per week for Fall 1990 as compared with 11.82 hours per week per student for Fall 2009. The strengthening of the District's student financial aid program over this period of time no doubt contributed substantially to this increase.

Currently, some 50 percent of students are 24 years of age or younger, the "traditional college age student". This compares with some 50 percent for students 25 years of age or over. Some 58 percent of students are female as compared with 42 percent male.

The national population over 18 years of age is 74.3 percent. All four of the cities in the Victor Valley College service area have young populations – under 70 percent of adult age.

This means a greater portion of the population is enrolled in K-12 schools – those that feed students to Victor Valley College.

Economic Development

The economy of the Victor Valley College service area during the 1990's and early 2000's was driven largely by the need for low-cost land by home owners and small businesses the first phase of the Third Ring of Economic Development from the Los Angeles Basin. This resulted in a large work force commuter population, some 50 percent of workers. This trend will continue for the foreseeable future: high population growth and small business growth. This is changing rapidly with the new Southern California Logistics Airport (formerly George Air Force Base) on the west side of Victorville, the Burlington Northern/Santa Fe building a third set of tracks through the Cajon Pass, and access to the I-15 Corridor. These are the driving components of the greater Victor Valley area becoming, as John Husing termed it, the new center for California's distribution industry.

The economy is driven by retail business and service jobs; construction, finance, insurance and real estate; small company manufacturing and transportation/distribution/utilities.

Victor Valley College is an integral component of the planning and development of the economy. It contributes to the economic development of the High Desert by cooperating with CSU, San Bernardino and several private colleges and universities in making upper division and graduate programs available on the Victor Valley College Campus.

An Educational Master Plan was completed in 2007 and is available on the Victor Valley College web site. And, Carrier Johnson completed a comprehensive Facilities Master Plan that is also available on the District's web site.

The District is prepared for the projected enormous population growth and the economic changes in its service area. It now must find the means to finance it.

Space Inventory

The annual review of all District facilities was completed during early fall 2009 to ensure that all Victor Valley Community College District facilities are accurately classified based on use and accurately measured based upon State standards. The results are filed with the



California Community College Chancellor's Office through its FUSION system. This space inventory must be performed and reported annually during the early fall with adjustments made as needed to keep the facilities inventory accurate. Later, the projects listed in the District's Five-Year Facility Plan interact with the Space Inventory to determine eligibility for state funding based on capacity (space)/load (students) ratio. The Advanced Technology Building and Performing Arts Center Addition were added in 2008/09 and the Adapted P. E. facility was added for 2009/10.

General Obligation Bond

The voters of the Victor Valley Community College District approved a \$297.5 million general obligation bond during the 2008 general election. This is enabling the District to address increasing population and traffic congestion problems persons are having reaching the Victor Valley campus. Westside and Eastside sites off the I-15 have been purchased to address these on a timely basis. The Eastside site will provide educational facilities for the District's Public Safety programs; Administration of Justice, Fire Technology and Emergency Medical Technology.

The bond issue will also enable the District to address needed facilities at the Victorville Campus; e.g., Student Services, Health, Science, Technology and Visual Arts classroom and laboratory needs.

The District needs to guickly address the process to gain Educational Center status for the Westside and Eastside sites. Educational Center status will qualify the sites for state facility funding and for the up to a million dollars additional annual operating funds for centers.

Energy Conservation

The District has been proactive in energy conservation – to reduce energy use and save resources. During the mid-1990's, the District took advantage of the California Energy Commission's loan program to improve gas and electricity efficiency across the campus. Through a Central Plant project, the District employs cold underground water to "pre-cool" its air conditioning system for a substantial portion of the campus - according to Southern California officials, this results in operating at 10 percent of the normal energy/ cost use. Once the water has been used for pre-cooling, it is dumped into the campus lake from which it is drawn to water the campus grounds and fields. This is a unique and highly effective system.

August 2008 the Victor Valley College Board of Trustees approved an agreement with Chevron Energy Solutions. The agreement includes:



- · Upgrade to the Central Plant
- New Energy Management System
- · New Computerized Irrigation System
- · Heating and Ventilation Upgrades in Several Buildings
- · Mechanical Upgrades and Complete Change-Out of Air Distribution Equipment
- · Lighting Upgrades in most Campus Buildings

A second phase may include additional campus buildings being retrofitted to work off the Central Plant. A photo voltaic (solar panels) farm is currently under construction at the Victorville campus on the lower campus. A One megawatt photo voltaic (concentrated solar panels) was brought on line to full production as of June 1st in accordance with the C.S.I. program and Southern California Edison. The power generated is used by the campus and reduces the overall dependency for electricity by 1/3. The system is located at the Victorville College lower campus.

It is forecast these will result in:

- Voiding 1,446 tons per year of greenhouse gas (CO2)
- Avoiding 2,373 pounds per year of NOX-acid rain
- The equivalent preserving 11 acres per year of forest from deforestation
- The equivalent of removing 284 cars per year off the highways

These will showcase Victor Valley College as a leader in energy efficiency and renewable energy technology in Southern California.

Project Description

1. Eastside Public Safety Training Center

This facility will provide classrooms, laboratories and offices for the Administration of Justice, Fire Technology and Paramedic programs via some 26,700 asf at the new 9.8 acre Eastside site. Currently, classes for these programs are conducted in a variety of campus locations, e.g., the Fire Technology program is located in the old Child Development Center on the lower campus at the entrance to the District's maintenance and operations area. For the 2009 Fall Semester, the Fire Technology program used this facility at 437.4 percent rate - 100 percent being full use. The Administration of Justice has not had a permanent home in its history at Victor Valley College. In recent years the program has used four modular units among the Lower Portable Buildings. For the 2009 Fall Semester, the program used these laboratory classrooms at a 316.8 percent rate.

Public Safety programs have unique classroom/laboratory training needs, e.g., a shooting range, an armory, rescue system training, hose evaluations, ventilation exercises, survival and extrication exercises, and simulation laboratories. It is anticipated that the Center will need to offer a variety of General Education course offerings to enable students to complete Associate Degree and transfer requirements.

As Public Safety is a growth industry across the state and the nation, these programs will continue to grow to meet the demand, potentially at a rate faster than the rest of the College.

3. Science Building Addition

The original design for the Science Building was based upon expanding the building by adding Life and Physical Science laboratory classrooms and faculty offices on the west side of the building. The prep space (lab service space) location anticipated this expansion. The expansion includes some 15,949 asf of laboratory and office space and a renovation of some 9,720 asf of lab service space for continuity and functionality for the addition. As with faculty offices in the original design being on the east side of the building, offices for the addition will be on the west side.

For the 2009 Fall Semester, science course offering enrollments (WSCH) were at 216.2 percent of capacity. In addition 4,315 WSCH were produced in Technology Center Room 142 and 2,227 Earth Science WSCH were produced in Liberal Arts Room 17. These demonstrate that the current Science Building needs to be more than doubled in capacity now. Projecting to the anticipated year of occupancy, 2014/15, the earlier projected size and cost may need to be updated.

4. Health Professions Building

This project is for the planning, design and construction of a new Health Professions building to house Allied Health/Nursing classrooms, laboratories and faculty offices: RDN, Respiratory Therapy, and Emergency Medical Technician.



For the 2009 Fall Semester, the Allied Health/Nursing laboratory classrooms were used at 376.4 percent of capacity. In addition another 1,029 WSCH were earned in Lower Portable Room 7 by health course offerings. And, the Health Lab in the Technology Center, Room 143, did not collect and/or report any of the WSCH earned by Health students during the 2009 Fall Semester (this should have been a substantial number). In addition, nursing faculty offices were located in the Health Portables (next to the Allied/Health/Nursing building.

The Health Professions Building is currently projected at some 30,000 asf; this would be a substantial increase over the current 7,805 asf. Considering the over capacity WSCH use numbers, 30,000 asf is a conservative projection for the 2016/2017 year of occupancy.

Along with Public Safety, Health is a growth industry in the state and the nation. These programs will grow at a more rapid rate than other Victor Valley College programs.

5. Student Services 1 & 2 Conversion

This project will reconstruct Student Services buildings #50 and #52 for other use following the completion of the Student Services One-Stop Center building. These are among the original Victor Valley College buildings having been constructed in 1965 – the buildings have experienced a variety of uses over their 45 years.

A probable conversion would be for classrooms, laboratories and faculty offices to accommodate the Mathematics and assorted Humanities disciplines. A second possible conversion would be to provide a home for Business disciplines: laboratories and faculty offices for teaching/learning for:

Computer Information Systems (CIS)
Business Education Technology (BET)
Accounting
Economics
Business Law
Business Statistics
Real Estate
Marketing

This would enable the Business programs to be more visible and accessible in one campus location. In the university setting, the College of Business is typically second only to the College of Liberal Arts in size. The laboratories need to reflect the latest in computer teaching environments.

Both of these conversions would require extensive computer networking for the building.

6. Green/Career Technology Building Replacement

This project will relocate technology and technology related programs from the lower campus to a site closer to the core of the campus, and will provide classrooms and laboratories for instructional programs from emerging "Green Technology". It is believed the current buildings are located on sites where liquefaction is an issue. If this proves to be true, this will be a Category A project. Category A projects receives the highest priority for State funding - up to 50 percent of State bond funds. This would also enable the District to submit a Category B project, Visual/Performing Arts Lab Building, at the same time for funding, otherwise that project would have to wait another year.

Programs that would relocate to new laboratories and offices include:

Agriculture/Horticulture Auto Technology Drafting Electronics Welding

Construction Technology would remain where it is – this is a modern and safe building with sufficient laboratory space.

Relocation of these programs would impact these buildings on the lower campus:

7. Visual/Performing Arts Lab Building

This project is to construct a modern teaching/learning facility for the Victor Valley College Visual Arts: Art, Photography, Music, and Fashion Design. This facility could include laboratories for teaching digital animation, digital music composition, sound mixing, digital art, and digital photography. These require a computer supported laboratory, learning environment.

This project would replace the current Art and Music buildings #20 and 22. The Music Building was constructed in 1968 and the Art Building in 1971. The design of these buildings make it cost prohibitive to reconstruct and enlarge them for the above teaching purposes. The Digital Animation and Fashion Design programs are located in the modular units.

The 2009 Fall Semester Room Use study found that the Music Building was used at 158.8 percent of the state capacity/load ratio and the Art Building at 129.0 percent, and Digital Animation at 272.2 percent of capacity.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this <u>1</u> day of July 2010 by and between Virginia Ontiveros ("Executive" of the Victor Valley College District Foundation), the Victor Valley College District Foundation ("Foundation") and the Victor Valley Community College District ("District").

The Foundation wishes to continue employing the Executive, and the Executive wishes to maintain employment with the Foundation, on the terms and subject to the conditions set forth in this Agreement. It is therefore agree as follows:

1. Employment. The Foundation shall employ the Executive and the Executive shall serve the Foundation as the Executive Director of the Foundation, with such duties and responsibilities as may be assigned to the Executive by the Board of Directors of the Foundation and as are normally associated with a position of this nature. The Executive shall devote her best efforts to the performance of her duties under this Agreement and shall perform them faithfully, diligently and in a manner consistent with the policies of the Foundation as determined from time to time by the Board of Directors of the Foundation. The Executive shall report to the President of the Foundation as the designated leader of the Foundation's Board of Directors. The Executive shall not serve as a director (or equivalent) position of any company or other entity and shall not receive fees or other remuneration for work performed either within or outside the scope of her employment without the prior written consent of the Board of Directors. This consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

All responsibility for salary, benefits, insurance or other entitlements shall be the responsibility of the Foundation. Although the District will be reimbursed for all expenses associated with the Executive Director's salary, benefits, insurance or other entitlements as agreed to by the Foundation, the District will not be responsible to the Executive Director should the Foundation become unable to pay those expenses. In the event the Executive Director is laid off, furloughed or terminated by the Foundation, the Executive Director has no rights for Reemployment, or bumping any District employees within the District.

The Foundation is recognized as an Auxiliary Organization pursuant to Education Code Section 72670.



VICTOR VALLEY COLLEGE DISTRICT FOUNDATION, Inc.

The Foundation Board shall develop in conjunction with the Executive Director goals and objectives upon which evaluation of performance will be based.

- 2. Terms of Employment. The Executive's employment by the Foundation under this Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2010 and terminate on June 30, 2013 unless terminated by either party pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.
- 3. Compensation. As full compensation for all services rendered by the Executive to the Foundation under this Agreement, the District shall pay the Executive the compensation set forth in Schedule A attached hereto. The compensation schedule may be amended from time to time in writing upon approval of the Foundation's Board of Directors and acceptance by the Executive. The Foundation shall reimburse the District for all costs associated with this compensation as allowed by the Master Agreement between the Foundation and the District.

4. Fringe Benefits; Expenses.

A. The Executive shall be entitled to all medical, dental, vision, workers compensation and pension benefits provided by the District to its management employees¹. The Foundation shall reimburse the District for all costs associated with providing these benefits to the Executive as allowed by the Master Agreement between the Foundation and the District.

¹ Disability benefits are intentionally excluded and the subject of a separate Foundation employment policy.

 - B. The Executive shall be entitled to all paid holidays provided by the District to its management employees.
 - C. The Executive shall be entitled to 20 days of paid vacation annually, to be taken at times selected by her, with prior concurrence of the Executive Committee. Vacation will not accrue beyond the term of this agreement.
 - D. The Executive shall be entitled to 5 days of paid sick leave. Sick leave shall not accrue beyond the term of this agreement.
 - E. The Foundation shall reimburse the Executive for all reasonable and necessary expenses incurred by her in connection with the performance of her services for the Foundation in accordance with the Foundation's policies and upon submission of appropriate documentation.
 - F. The Foundation shall provide and pay for term life insurance coverage with a face amount of \$100,000 for the Executive.
- **5. Termination:** The Foundation shall have the right to terminate this Agreement and the Executive's employment with the Foundation for cause. For purposes of this Agreement, the term "cause" shall mean:
 - A. Any breach of the Executive's obligations under this Agreement.
 - B. Fraud, theft or gross malfeasance on the part of the Executive, including without limitation, conduct of a felonious or criminal nature, conduct involving moral turpitude, embezzlement or misappropriation of assets;
 - C. The habitual use of drugs or intoxicants;
 - D. The Executive's failure, refusal or neglect to perform her duties under this Agreement within a reasonable period under the circumstances after written notice from the Foundation President describing the breach and offering the Executive the opportunity to cure same;
 - E. Repeated violation by the Executive of any of the work rules or written policies of the Foundation after written notice of the violation has been provided in writing to the Executive;
 - F. Breach of standards adopted by the Foundation governing professional independence or conflicts of interest.
 - G. Death or disability which permanently impairs the ability of the Executive to fulfill her duties under this Agreement.

If the employment of the Executive is terminated for cause, neither the Foundation, nor the District shall be obligated to make any further payment to the Executive nor to continue to provide any benefit to the Executive under this Agreement.

6. Severance: If for any reason other than for cause as defined in this Agreement, the Foundation terminates this Agreement and the Executive's employment with the Foundation, the Executive shall be entitled to severance compensation equal to six (6) weeks wages under the terms of this Agreement.

7. Miscellaneous:

- A. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- B. This Agreement contains a complete statement of all arrangements made between the Foundation, District and the Executive with respect to its subject matter, supersedes all previous agreements, written or oral, among them relating to its subject matter and cannot be modified, amended or terminated orally. Amendments may be made to this Agreement at any time if mutually agreed upon in writing.
- C. The failure of any party to insist upon the strict adherence of any term of this Agreement on any occasion shall not be considered a waiver or deprive that party of the right thereafter to insist upon strict adherence to that term or any other term of this Agreement.
- D. The invalidity or unenforceability of any term or provision of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining terms or provisions of this Agreement which shall remain in full force and effect and any such invalid or unenforceable term or provision shall be given full effect as far as possible. If any term or provision of this Agreement is invalid or unenforceable in one jurisdiction, it shall not affect the validity or enforceability of that term in any other jurisdiction.

This Agreement is not assignable by any party without express written consent of all parties.

The Employee shall be compensated as allowed in the Employment Agreement as followed:

For the period beginning July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2013:

\$110,000 annually (\$9,166.67 per month) to be paid by the District and will be reimbursed by the Foundation per the terms of the Employment Agreement.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this ___day of July 2010 by and between **Glennis Duncan** ("Employee" of the Victor Valley College District Foundation), the Victor Valley College District Foundation ("Foundation") and the Victor Valley Community College District ("District").

The Foundation wishes to continue employing the Employee, and the Employee wishes to maintain employment with the Foundation, on the terms and subject to the conditions set forth in this Agreement. It is therefore agree as follows:

1. Employment. The Foundation shall employ the Employee and the Employee shall serve the Foundation as the Executive / Financial Assistant of the Foundation, with such duties and responsibilities as may be assigned to the Employee by the Executive Director of the Foundation, identified within the adopted Job Description for this position (BP4) and as are normally associated with a position of this nature. The Employee shall devote her best efforts to the performance of her duties under this Agreement and shall perform them faithfully, diligently and in a manner consistent with the policies of the Foundation as determined from time to time by the Board of Directors of the Foundation. The Employee shall report to the Executive Director of the Foundation. The Employee shall not serve as a director (or equivalent) position of any company or other entity and shall not receive fees or other remuneration for work performed either within or outside the scope of her employment without the prior written consent of the Executive Director. This consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

All responsibility for salary, benefits, insurance or other entitlements shall be the responsibility of the Foundation. Although the District will be reimbursed for all expenses associated with the Executive / Financial Assistant's salary, benefits, insurance or other entitlements as agreed to by the Foundation, the District will not be responsible to the Executive / Financial Assistant should the Foundation become unable to pay those expenses. In the event the Executive / Financial Assistant is laid off, furloughed or terminated by the Foundation, the Executive / Financial Assistant has no rights for Reemployment, or bumping any District employees within the District.

The Foundation is recognized as an Auxiliary Organization pursuant to Education Code Section 72670.

- 2. Terms of Employment. The Employee's employment by the Foundation under this Agreement shall commence on July 1, 2010 and terminate on June 30, 2012 unless terminated by either party pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.
- **3. Compensation.** As full compensation for all services rendered by the Employee to the Foundation under this Agreement, the District shall pay the Employee the compensation set forth in Schedule A attached hereto. The compensation schedule may be amended from time to time in writing upon approval of the Foundation's Board of Directors and acceptance by the Employee. The Foundation shall reimburse the District for all costs associated with this compensation as allowed by the Master Agreement between the Foundation and the District.

4. Fringe Benefits; Expenses.

- A. The Employee shall be entitled to all medical, dental, vision, workers compensation and pension benefits provided by the District to its management employees.¹ The Foundation shall reimburse the District for all costs associated with providing these benefits to the Employee as allowed by the Master Agreement between the Foundation and the District.
- B. The Employee shall be entitled to all paid holidays provided by the District to its management employees.
- C. The Employee shall be entitled to 10 days of paid vacation annually, to be taken at times selected by her, with prior concurrence of the Executive Director. Vacation will not accrue beyond the term of this agreement.
- D. The Employee shall be entitled to 5 days of paid sick leave. Sick leave shall not accrue beyond the term of this agreement.
- E. The Foundation shall reimburse the Employee for all reasonable and necessary expenses incurred by her in connection with the performance of her services for the Foundation in accordance with the Foundation's policies and upon submission of appropriate documentation.
- **5. Termination:** The Foundation shall have the right to terminate this Agreement and the Employee's employment with the Foundation for cause. For purposes of this Agreement, the term "cause" shall mean:
 - A. Any breach of the Employee's obligations under this Agreement.
 - B. Fraud, theft or gross malfeasance on the part of the Employee, including without limitation, conduct of a felonious or criminal nature, conduct involving moral turpitude, embezzlement or misappropriation of assets;
 - C. The habitual use of drugs or intoxicants;
 - D. The Employee's failure, refusal or neglect to perform her duties under this Agreement within a reasonable period under the circumstances after written notice from the Executive Director describing the breach and offering the Employee the opportunity to cure same:
 - E. Repeated violation by the Employee of any of the work rules or written policies of the Foundation after written notice of the violation has been provided in writing to the Employee;
 - F. Breach of standards adopted by the Foundation governing professional independence or conflicts of interest.
 - G. Death or disability which permanently impairs the ability of the Employee to fulfill her duties under this Agreement.

If the employment of the Executive is terminated for cause, neither the Foundation, nor the District shall be obligated to make any further payment to the Employee nor to continue to provide any benefit to the Employee under this Agreement.

6. Severance: If for any reason other than for cause as defined in this Agreement, the Foundation terminates this Agreement and the Employee's employment with the Foundation,

the Employee shall be entitled to severance compensation equal to two (2) weeks wages under the terms of this Agreement.

7. Miscellaneous:

- A. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- B. This Agreement contains a complete statement of all arrangements made between the Foundation, District and the Employee with respect to its subject matter, supersedes all previous agreements, written or oral, among them relating to its subject matter and cannot be modified, amended or terminated orally. Amendments may be made to this Agreement at any time if mutually agreed upon in writing.
- C. The failure of any party to insist upon the strict adherence of any term of this Agreement on any occasion shall not be considered a waiver or deprive that party of the right thereafter to insist upon strict adherence to that term or any other term of this Agreement.
- D. The invalidity or unenforceability of any term or provision of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining terms or provisions of this Agreement which shall remain in full force and effect and any such invalid or unenforceable term or provision shall be given full effect as far as possible. If any term or provision of this Agreement is invalid or unenforceable in one jurisdiction, it shall not affect the validity or enforceability of that term in any other jurisdiction.
- E. This Agreement is not assignable by any party without express written consent of all parties.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this ___day of August 2010 by and between **Jesika Connaghan** ("Employee" of the Victor Valley College District Foundation), the Victor Valley College District Foundation ("Foundation") and the Victor Valley Community College District ("District").

The Foundation wishes to continue employing the Employee, and the Employee wishes to maintain employment with the Foundation, on the terms and subject to the conditions set forth in this Agreement. It is therefore agree as follows:

1. Employment. The Foundation shall employ the Employee and the Employee shall serve the Foundation as the Donor Relations Assistant of the Foundation, with such duties and responsibilities as may be assigned to the Employee by the Executive Director of the Foundation, identified within the adopted Job Description for this position (BP4) and as are normally associated with a position of this nature. The Employee shall devote her best efforts to the performance of her duties under this Agreement and shall perform them faithfully, diligently and in a manner consistent with the policies of the Foundation as determined from time to time by the Board of Directors of the Foundation. The Employee shall report to the Executive Director of the Foundation. The Employee shall not serve as a director (or equivalent) position of any company or other entity and shall not receive fees or other remuneration for work performed either within or outside the scope of her employment without the prior written consent of the Executive Director. This consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

All responsibility for salary, benefits, insurance or other entitlements shall be the responsibility of the Foundation. Although the District will be reimbursed for all expenses associated with the Donor Relations Assistant's salary, benefits, insurance or other entitlements as agreed to by the Foundation, the District will not be responsible to the Donor Relations Assistant should the Foundation become unable to pay those expenses. In the event the Donor Relations Assistant is laid off, furloughed or terminated by the Foundation, the Donor Relations Assistant has no rights for Reemployment, or bumping any District employees within the District.

The Foundation is recognized as an Auxiliary Organization pursuant to Education Code Section 72670.

- **2. Terms of Employment.** The Employee's employment by the Foundation under this Agreement shall commence on **August 1**, **2010 and terminate on June 30**, **2011** unless terminated by either party pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.
- **3. Compensation.** As full compensation for all services rendered by the Employee to the Foundation under this Agreement, the District shall pay the Employee the compensation set forth in Schedule A attached hereto. The compensation schedule may be amended from time to time in writing upon approval of the Foundation's Board of Directors and acceptance by the

Employee. The Foundation shall reimburse the District for all costs associated with this compensation as allowed by the Master Agreement between the Foundation and the District.

4. Fringe Benefits; Expenses.

- A. The Employee shall be entitled to all medical, dental, vision, workers compensation and pension benefits provided by the District to its management employees.¹ The Foundation shall reimburse the District for all costs associated with providing these benefits to the Employee as allowed by the Master Agreement between the Foundation and the District.
- B. The Employee shall be entitled to all paid holidays provided by the District to its management employees.
- C. The Employee shall be entitled to 10 days of paid vacation annually, to be taken at times selected by her, with prior concurrence of the Executive Director. Vacation will not accrue beyond the term of this agreement.
- D. The Employee shall be entitled to 5 days of paid sick leave. Sick leave shall not accrue beyond the term of this agreement.
- E. The Foundation shall reimburse the Employee for all reasonable and necessary expenses incurred by her in connection with the performance of her services for the Foundation in accordance with the Foundation's policies and upon submission of appropriate documentation.
- **5. Termination:** The Foundation shall have the right to terminate this Agreement and the Employee's employment with the Foundation for cause. For purposes of this Agreement, the term "cause" shall mean:
 - A. Any breach of the Employee's obligations under this Agreement.
 - B. Fraud, theft or gross malfeasance on the part of the Employee, including without limitation, conduct of a felonious or criminal nature, conduct involving moral turpitude, embezzlement or misappropriation of assets;
 - C. The habitual use of drugs or intoxicants;
 - D. The Employee's failure, refusal or neglect to perform her duties under this Agreement within a reasonable period under the circumstances after written notice from the Executive Director describing the breach and offering the Employee the opportunity to cure same;
 - E. Repeated violation by the Employee of any of the work rules or written policies of the Foundation after written notice of the violation has been provided in writing to the Employee:

 - G. Death or disability which permanently impairs the ability of the Employee to fulfill her duties under this Agreement.

If the employment of the Executive is terminated for cause, neither the Foundation, nor the District shall be obligated to make any further payment to the Employee nor to continue to provide any benefit to the Employee under this Agreement.

6. Severance: If for any reason other than for cause as defined in this Agreement, the Foundation terminates this Agreement and the Employee's employment with the Foundation, the Employee shall be entitled to severance compensation equal to two (2) weeks wages under the terms of this Agreement.

The invalidity or unenforceability of any term or provision of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining terms or provisions of this Agreement which shall remain in full force and effect and any such invalid or unenforceable term or provision shall be given full effect as far as possible. If any term or provision of this Agreement is invalid or unenforceable in one jurisdiction, it shall not affect the validity or enforceability of that term in any other jurisdiction.
- E. This Agreement is not assignable by any party without express written consent of all parties.
